THE HOLIDAY SEASON AT CHEMAWA

A Week of Good Cheer and Good Will on Part of Both Home Folks and Visitors

The entertainment given in the school auditorium on Christmas eve consisted of a well-prepared program in which practically all grades were represented. A processional march by the school band, followed with a song, "See, Amid the Winter's Snow," rendered by the entire school, were the opening numbers. Carrie Anderson, in her usual charming manner, recited "How Santa Claus Came." A motion song by eight little girls dressed in white was a very pretty number. A recitation, "A Christmas Wish," given by Thelma Orsen was well received. She evidenced good drilling, her delivery being especially good, the selection was patriotic and well chosen. Athen Simmons also gave a recitation, "The Glad Evangel," in his earnest manner. A number by the band, "Alita" (Wild Flower), charmed the audience. Ten smaller boys of the sixth grade appeared dressed up as so many Chinamen, with their pig tails and laundry bags over their shoulders, sang a number, "We don't Havee any Clismas Time," which evoked much applause. The exercise, "The Plan that Failed," by Edwin Rousselle and Elmer Therriault was a feature of the evening. These boys carried out their parts well and held the audience throughout. The display of mechanical toys by Henry Campbell and seven others was a novel number and much enjoyed. The closing number consisted of a song by the school, entitled "Calm on the Listening Ear of Night," followed by a march, "Majestic Band."
