ATHLETIC NOTES

The annual clash between Mitchell Hall and Brewer Hall was played on Christmas Day. Each year this contest is looked forward to by the students with as much enthusiasm and interest as the Annual World Series in Basketball.

The closest they came to being defeated was in the game with the Dairymen, when at the close of the game the score was a tie and an extra five minutes were played to decide the game, the Blacksmiths winning out by a score of 26 to 24. Johnson for the Blacksmiths was injured in the game with the Painters and was unable to finish the series with his team, Berry replacing him as center.
