An innovation during the afternoon in the way of entertainment in the shape of a joint society meeting on the campus was given, where speeches, stunts, music and various exercises took place. It was enjoyable in the extreme.

Too much cannot be said in praise of the operetta, "The Emperor's Daughter," which was given Tuesday evening. It was an elaborate entertainment with a cast of nearly one hundred students. The auditorium was jammed and it is said Chemawa never has put on a finer entertainment. Instead of being amateurish it is said to be more nearly a professional entertainment. Words cannot express the beauty of the setting.

Wednesday was given over to inspection of all departments during the morning, with a splendid exhibition by the various physical culture classes in the gymnasium during the afternoon—dumb bells, Indian clubs by both boys and girls, all kinds of athletic stunts on the various gymnastic apparatus. A full two hours entertainment was given to the satisfaction and pleasure of the crowd. Indeed, the large gym was crowded to its limit. The band concert and dress parade were also of a high order.

That evening another tremendous success was scored by the Seniors in the rendition of a class play called "Sylvia." Never has the 1920 class made greater efforts or were better drilled than in this play. The hundreds of guests were in doubt as to which of the two plays was the best; that the Tuesday operetta was excellent and the class play was also excellent is the universal verdict. Indeed, Chemawa put up two excellent entertainments to the credit of all concerned.

The competitive military drill on Thursday was strongly contested by each company. The captains had for week previous drilled their respective companies to the very minute. The two army officers who were judges remarked that never had they witnessed more accurate maneuvers and that they were not only astonished at the excellence of the drilling,

but were also delighted to see such a fine body of young men and women. The winning company of boys was company B, captained by Andrew White; that of the girls company B, captained by Annabel Woods.

The graduation exercises took place on Thursday evening. Governor Ben W. Olcott presented the diplomas and Honorable Fred Lockley, of the Oregon Journal, made the speech of the evening. The program was fine. The nineteen graduates were on the stage eager and smiling, and really inspired the audience with their earnestness and ladylike and gentlemanly bearing. The exercises were of a high order, well-prepared and delightfully delivered. Mr. Lockley gave a splendid address and charmed the student body and graduates as well as all present with his kindly and interesting talk. The Governor also addressed the class and very graciously delivered the diplomas.
