## CHEMAWA VS WILLAMETTE

Last Saturday our varsity met defeat at the hands of the strong Willamette University eleven by the score 14 to 6. The score hardly indicates the closeness of the game. The Bearcats did not register until the second half, when they carried the ball from the center of the field to our ten-yard line and were held till the fourth down when Rarey charged into the line and slid around the left end for the first score. Later in the third period Lyman made certain victory for W. U. when he scooped up the ball on a fluke play and ran through a clear field for the second touchdown. Irvine kicked both goals.

After a series of line plunges, end runs and a long forward pass Louis Colby carried the ball across Willamette's line in the last quarter, registering our only score. Downie failed to kick the goal.

This marked the initial game for our squad this season and each man did himself credit in his position, except for the numerous and costly fumbles to which we can justly credit the loss of this game. Our inability to hang onto the pigskin and not the inability to make yardage spelled our defeat. Our backfield consistently made long gains through Willamette's line only to lose the ball on a fumble when a score appeared certain.

The defensive work of our line and the backing up of the line by our back field was such that it would have been a credit to any team in its first game. Willamette found it almost impossible to penetrate our line. There was no yardage gained after a tackle was made. In most instances three men pinned the runner to the ground instead of one.

We are confident that the two dozen men turning out for practice each evening will give a good account of themselves in the remaining games on our schedule. Next Saturday the varsity will play the O.A.C. Freshmen at Corvallis, an account of which will be given in the next issue of the American.
