FOOTBALL—CHEMAWA VS. O. A. C. FRESHMEN

After a hard struggle the husky O. A. C. freshmen defeated our team last Saturday afternoon on the college gridiron 13 to 6. Although the Freshmen recovered the ball during the first five minutes of play on our five-yard line after a fumble, they lacked the necessary punch to carry the pigskin past our line, which stood like a stone wall against the shifts and attacks of the rooks. They lost the ball on downs, also their only chance of registering a score in the first half and we kicked the ball out of danger.

The initial score of the game was made in the first quarter by the Freshmen after completing a pretty, long, forward pass to right end, and who raced along the side line for forty yards to a touchdown. Shortly after the kick-off Martin Colby recovered the ball on a fumble and ran forty-five yards through a broken field for a touchdown, tying the score. Both teams failed to kick goal.

With a series of line plunges, end runs, and successful forward passes we carried the ball from our five-yard line to, and for a second had one foot over the Freshmen's goal line, only to lose it in the next rush on a fumble. The rooks punted out of danger and once more we carried the ball back beneath their goal posts and successfully passed the ball across the line, when time was called. Just a fraction of a second too late for the score to count.

The rooks annexed their next score in the last quarter. We had carried the ball to their thirty-yard line and attempted a long forward pass over the left from the right side of the line which was intercepted by the rooks and carried between the goal posts. The kick was shooting far beneath the bar when Spearson jumped forward to stop the ball which hit his hands and bounded up and over the bar making the score 13 to 6.

Our back field made consistent yardage through the Freshmen line and our ends pulled several passes out of the air for long gains, but we failed to get the ball across the line often enough to win the game.

Louis Colby and Reginald Downie were taken out of the game on account of injuries received and were replaced by Roy Nuckolls and Joe Bettles. They will probably be unable to play next Saturday here against the University of Oregon Freshmen. This game is considered the hardest on our schedule as the Freshmen have repeatedly held their varsity to a standstill.

SECOND TEAM DEFEATS SALEM HIGH SCHOOL

Our fighting second string men proved too much for the Salem High School team by defeating them last Friday afternoon on the Willamette University field. The game was well advertised and a large and enthusiastic crowd witnessed Chemawa's hot shots take the high school students down the line 20 to 12.

The second stringers' passes via the aerial route and off tackle cross bucks proved too deep for the high school students to solve and they completed passes and made runs anywhere from five to sixty-five yards at a clip.

Joe Bettles was the sensation of the game. Early in the first quarter he picked up a fumble and ran 95 yards for a touchdown with the Salem team hot on his heels. Later he tucked a forward pass under his arm and ran 65 yards through a broken field for another score. The high school has a good team, but the way our hot shots mixed up the passes and line bucks was too foxy for them to solve.

James Choate, Chemawa's sensational half-back of last year's team, has just returned and is gladly received by the varsity members. "Smiling Jim" was our biggest ground gainer last year.

It is also reported that George Nix is now in Seattle on his way here to school from Alaska. Big Nix is some tackle and has been a tower of strength to our team in that position for some time. Early in the season we heard from these two boys expressing their regrets at being unable to be here at the beginning of the term on account of matters that had to be looked after at home.

The Brewer Hall team came back strong last week and defeated the Mitchell Hall eleven 14 to 13. The result of this game makes a win for each team; the next game will decide the championship. The interest ran high at the first of these games and increases with each one. The Mitchell Hall band furnished the music at the last game and it is hoped that both bands will join together at the next.
