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CHEMAWA CLOSES SUCCESSFUL SEASON WITH VICTORY OVER GOLDENDALE LEGION— 21 TO 0

Our 1920 football squad closed a very successful season when it defeated the Goldendale Legion team 21 to 0 on Thanksgiving Day at Goldendale, Washington. Coach Sanders and fourteen men boarded the train at Chemawa early Thursday morning, arriving at Goldendale shortly after noon.

Both teams averaged about the same in weight. Though the field was wet and soggy the game was fast and our team completed several forward passes for long gains. Louis Colby also got away and brought the spectators to their feet by a 40-yard run on a criss-cross play. Early in the second quarter Nuckolls completed two pretty passes that gained 20 yards each and brought the ball within the Legion's one-yard line. Choate carried the ball across the chalkline in the next rush and kicked goal for the first score. The first half ended 7 to 0.

But for two short passes the second half was held entirely to straight football. In the third and fourth quarters Chemawa started to rush the ball from the 20-yard line on the kick-off and steady, determined line bucks and off-end runs, gradually carried the ball to the Goldendale goal line. Each time Choate plunged across the last mark for a touchdown and booted the ball between the posts.

With only three minutes to play in the last period Chemawa carried the ball to the center of the field on the kick-off. Two rushes placed the ball on the Legion's 12-yard line and the whistle blew, ending the game 21 to 0.

The game was hard fought and every point earned. Although the Goldendale team was unable at any time to advance the ball against the strong, stubborn defense of the Chemawa team they managed to hold the ball for four downs and punt 40 to 45 yards, thereby keeping the score down.

The offensive and defensive work of our line and back field was splendid and pretty to see and won the admiration of many spectators.

Buchert also excited the crowd in the final period when he dashed off left end and through the backfield for 45 yards only to be downed by the safety. The games ended 13 to 0.

The "Hotshots" turned in the suits Monday satisfied with the team's victories. They batted a thousand. Played three and won three games, and rolled up 40 points to their opponents' 12.
