ITEM OF \$110,000**SENATOR McNARY GETS ADDITIONAL SUM IN BILL FOR CHEMAWA**

Washington, Feb. 2.—Chemawa Indian School, through the efforts of Senator McNary has an additional appropriation item of \$110,000 in the Indian appropriation bill reported to the senate today. Added to the \$147,000 allowed by the house the senate appropriates \$40,000 for a heating plant and \$70,000 for a boys' dormitory, making the total appropriation \$257,400.
