WE WIN FROM WILLAMETTE UNIVERSITY

The following clipping from the Oregonian tells of the fate of Willamette's track team last Friday about as well as it could be told:

The Chemawa Indians ran away from the Willamette track men Friday afternoon in a dual track meet, winning by a score of 78-44. The Indians took everything in weight events and finished well up in the sprints. The relay was the feature, Jackson of Willamette passing Warbonnet, the last Chemawa runner, after the latter had annexed a lead of 15 yards.

Choate, Chemawa sprinter and broad jumper, was high point man of the afternoon with 19 points, while Irvine of Willamette came second with 11; Fox, a frosh distance man, sprang a surprise by taking the half-mile and finishing second in the mile for Willamette. Summary:
