WE WIN AGAIN

The following from The Oregonian tells the story in an explanatory manner:

Vere Windnagle, track coach at Washington high school, returned yesterday with his athletes from the Chemawa Indian School, where on Friday afternoon the Chemawa team defeated the Colonials in a dual track meet, 103 to 19.

Choate was high point man for the Indians with first in the 100-yard dash, discus throw, second in the shotput, third in the javelin, and tied for first in the broad jump, all for a total of 19 points. Spearson of Chemawa won the mile easily in the fast time of 4:35.4.

Richmond was high point man for Washington with six points. Upon his return yesterday Coach Windnagle praised the Chemawa Indians highly and said his athletes received fine treatment at their hands. The Indians, according to the Washington coach, are fine sportsmen and are also a fast bunch of athletes.

Shot put—G. Nix, C., first; Choate, C., second; N. Nix, C., third. Distance, 37 feet 7 inches.

One-half mile relay—Won by Chemawa. (Edwards, Liljegren, Colby, Choate.) Time, 1 minute 38 seconds.
