CHEMAWA DEFEATS ARLETA

Chemawa 21, Arleta 6, marked the result of the exciting game played here last Saturday afternoon against the Arleta Athletic Club of Portland.

The size and speed of the Club men made the outcome look rather dark for Chemawa before the game began and Saunders' 95-yard run for a touchdown on the first kickoff did not brighten the prospects, but it must have put determination into our footballers for Captain Peratrovich and his men appeared to grow stronger and stronger as the game progressed.

On the second kickoff Nix booted the ball well back to Arleta's goal line. There our varsity held the club men for downs, and Johnson, our speedy little end, slipped through the line, blocked the punt, recovered the ball and made the final score of the first period. Bettles' educated toe kicked goal. Chemawa 7; Arleta 6.

From their 40-yard line, Bettles, Sampson, Buchert, and Johnson carried the ball within the Club's six-yard line by very spectacular end runs and line bucks, where they lost the ball on downs. This marked the only time in the second period either team came near scoring.

The Club team opened up in the second half with cross bucks and succeeded in completing several passes, but for the greater part, they were intercepted by Buchert, Bettles, Sampson and Hansen, who carried the ball back each time 10 or 15 yards.

After rushing the ball to the Club's 35-yard line twice in the third quarter, Bettles drove the ball into Buchert's outstretched arms the first time and into Johnson's the second, both for scores. Each time Bettles kicked goal. The quarter ended Chemawa 21, Arleta 6.

Our line men, Johnson and LaPointe, ends; Nix and Captain Peratrovich, tackles; Thomas, Shadura and Ell, guards, and Williams, center, displayed their wares to perfection by holding the Club men throughout the game for downs, and ripping truck holes in Arleta's line for our backs, who shot through time after time for yardage.

After being forced back to their goal line the Club men completed a pretty 40-yard forward pass from punt formation just before the final shot was fired.
