CHEMAWA DEFEATS SALEM HIGH

In the first inning our hitters clouted Dave Adolph, Salem twirler, for six hits, five runs, and accumulated a total of 17 hits in the seven innings.

Five scattered hits was all Phinney would allow and those so far apart that they counted little toward the Salem score. Reinhart, Jones and Rex Adolph, Salem's hard-hitting three, fanned the air and warmed

the bench much the same as their teammates. Some people say that Salem played a poor game, and we are much inclined to agree with them, for they really made a poor showing against our varsity.

Tom Claplanhoo, our right fielder who started early in the season to work as a pitcher but who has played in a field position because of his hitting ability, made the sensational plays of the game when he chased entirely out of his territory and robbed Salem of two of the surest looking hits ever made, saving a run with the first catch and ending the game with the second.

MT. ANGEL TRIMMED
