ATHLETIC NOTES

Over-confidence has caused the defeat of many a team, and ours was badly beaten last Thursday in Portland by Columbia University, 14 to 3, a team which we defeated here earlier in the season 12 to 3, because the boys thought they would win in a walk so were not ready to fight and make the best of bad breaks. The result was that an error in the very beginning of the game upset the whole team and Columbia handed us the lemon.

Father Farley, the veteran coach of Columbia team, had his hitters all set for our pitchers and they hammered the offerings of our southpaw, Fleury, for several solid swats and two runs at the outset of the game. In the second inning Wilson replaced Fleury and Columbia bunted him to death. As a rule Leander handles bunts and fields his position perfectly, but in this game he booted all but one of the seven chances he got. He had a lot of help in mussing things up, however, for the entire team played a very ragged game.

On Friday the team met its Waterloo for the second time in two days when North Pacific Dental College beat us by a 7 to 5 score. The team has no alibis for the loss of this game for they put up a splendid game against a fast organization, but were out-hit in the pinches.

Charles George and William Brendible played a brilliant game for us in the field. Both of them made catches that looked impossible to get and saved us from a much larger score.

These two games revealed the fact that our infielders are not getting the ball away fast enough and the result is that their throws to first base are being beat out by the runner.

A return game will be played with the Dental College on Decoration Day.

Sunday afternoon the Freshmen ended up the baseball series for the class championship by cleaning-up on the Juniors by a 6 to 5 score. That was a hard pill for the Juniors to swallow, but they did it gracefully. Little Bill Brendible, the Freshie southpaw hurler, had the Juniors eating out of his hand and kept them fanning the air while he, with apparent ease, shot the ball to his catcher.

This victory for the Freshies just about makes them

the dark horse for the year. At the outset of class activities they were rated as poor contenders in any line of sport, but they ran the Seniors a close second for the football championship and won the basketball championship with flying colors and just now have walked off with the baseball honors. Discus throw—Solomon Fleury, first; Moses George, second.

Solomon Fleury was the high point man of the meet. With 18 points to his credit he came out head and shoulders above his closest competitor.
