Now that you have gained one great social victory in the building of this beautiful structure, others will follow, I am sure.

The Indians have always been fond of games and exhibited great endurance and skill in playing Indian football, lacrosse, hockey, and running long-distance foot races, all of which have been adopted in some form by other races. That Indians are maintaining their records as athletes was recently demonstrated by your Philip Osif, eighteen year old Pima boy, when he finished first in both the Junior and Senior Division of the six-mile run at Philadelphia and thus won the A. A. U. Championship. On October 10, in a marathon race of five miles up the Broadmoor-Cheyenne mountain road in Colorado, seven Indians easily ran away from six white men. The winner, a Hopi, making the distance in 35.49 3-4 minutes.

Although many of your friends who are here today will not be present to witness future athletic contests, they will be "listening in" and in spirit will join the hundreds of your classmates in their shouts of encouragement.
