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ATHLETIC NOTES

Saturday was a banner day for our track men. They ran, jumped, and threw the javelin, shot and discus all around the Albany College track team, to a score of 86 to 30. Though it was a cold and windy day, our student body turned out to witness the track ability of our almost brand new team. With but a few exceptions the personnel has changed completely, but we dare say for the better. The new ones appear the most promising of the aggregation. They look like real finds in the line of sport and already perform like veterans. Under the careful tutelage of their coach, Mr. Sanders, these boys will develop into a formidable track team.

The three highpoint men of the meet are wearers of the red and white: Lawrence Pratt, first with 11 1-2; Gideon Brings Grub, second, 10; and Solomon Fleury, third, 8 1-2.
