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ATHLETIC NOTES

Our boys did so well against the O. A. C. Rooks at Corvallis last week that they looked victorious in defeat. For sixty minutes they battled the freshmen almost to a standstill. The continual stream of freshmen ushered into the game did not affect their morale nor their spirit, for they carried the "fight" to the victors every inch of the way and every minute of the game. The work of our linemen was really a feature of the game. They charged so fiercely and the back-field tackled so deadly that the ball carrier usually stayed "put." The result was that the Rooks were often stopped back of the scrimmage line and thrown for a big loss. The greater part of the first three periods was played in freshmen territory and early in the third our team started a goal line march that looked like a certain touchdown. With Capt. Fleury, Peter Cimino and Lawrence Pratt carrying the ball they took it from their 45-yard line to within one foot of the goal where the Rooks pooled all their strength and stopped the prettiest and fiercest drive of the game.

In the closing minutes of the contest the freshmen made their only touchdown. With time almost spent and an 0 to 0 score staring them in the face the Rooks started their only march of the game and scored. They kicked the goal and the game ended 7 to 0 against us.

Our starting line-up follows: George Meachem, left end; Peter Rassmussen, left tackle; Roy Peratrovich, left guard; Percy Roush, center; Joe Peratrovich, right guard; Ernest Brunoe, right tackle; Eldred George, right end; Jake Atkins, quarterback; Solomon Fleury, left half; Peter Cimino, fullback; Lawrence Pratt, right half. No changes were made until the last few minutes of the game.

The individual work of each of these boys was outstanding—it had to be in order to stand up against a squad that outweighed them 18 or 20 pounds to the man. It would be impossible to point to any one player and say that he was the star of the game—they were all stars.

Since the game with Columbia University our line has been strengthened a great deal. Peter Rassmussen is back to fill his position at left tackle, and Peter does a great big job of it. Ernest Brunoe is playing right tackle. This is Ernest's first year on the varsity but you would never guess it. Both of these boys stand well over six feet and are comparatively fast and tough to handle. With the Peratrovich brothers, Eldred George and George Meachem and Percy Roush along side of those two tackles we have a personnel in our forward wall that bids fair to better the best line we have had in several seasons.

The squad has been drilling hard this week to defeat Corvallis High here next Saturday. They are coming to wipe out the 20 to 0 game they lost to us here a year ago.

On Friday evening we hope to have a "pep" meeting to prepare for the next two games. Both will be played here. Corvallis next Saturday, and Linfield College the following Saturday. That which confronts the cheering section the most now is a cheer leader. None have as yet been elected officially to that position for either the boys or girls. This will be done Friday. It should be remembered that the holders of these positions are entitled to wear the official "C," which is worth striving for.
