PORTLAND VESPER SERVICE

Nine girls of the Chemawa Y. W. C. A. went to Portland on Sunday afternoon to assist in the Vesper Service of the Portland Y. W. C. A., at which Superintendent Lipps gave the main address. The Vesper service marked the beginning of the world's week of fellowship and prayer which is observed by the "Y" Association throughout the world. Vina Smith, pres-

ident of our campus Y. W. C. A., presided at the meeting which was opened by the entire assembly singing America, accompanied by Spyna Howard at the piano. The devotional service was led by Cleo Plasteur, followed by a solo, "Grateful, O Lord, Am I" sung by Elvira Silas.

Vina then introduced Supt. Lipps who spoke of the so-called "Indian Problem," first in its national significance, and then in its relation to local communities, particularly in Oregon. He expressed his appreciation of the splendid co-operation and help which the national and local Y. W. C. A.s are giving to the government in its program of education, as well as to groups of individual Indian girls throughout the country. Following this talk, a group of six Chemawa girls sang a three-part chorus, "Spirit of Light." Vina then asked all former Chemawa students who were in the audience to come to the platform and sing with the girls the Y. W. C. A. hymn, "Follow the Gleam." About forty girls responded to this request and sang with much feeling the beautiful ceremonial hymn. The school song provided a fitting close to the program.

About two hundred and fifty people attended the afternoon service and tea was served to this group by several of the Chemawa girls who are living in Portland. For those who went down from Chemawa a delicious supper was provided by the Religious Work Committee of the Portland Association, and served by Pauline Kamkoff, Emily Johnson, Josephine Nelson and Anna Jackson. Mr. and Mrs. Mason and Miss Judd and Miss Eakin accompanied the girls on the trip.
