

FOLLOWING IN MOTHER'S FOOTSTEPS

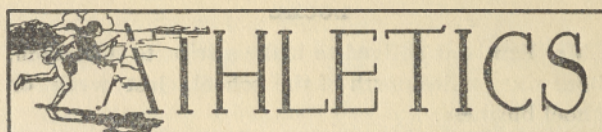

In the year 1901, Miss Daisy Wasson of Oregon, entered the Training School as a pupil nurse. Miss Elizabeth Edge of Downingtown, was interested in her and had asked that she be admitted. She had been an inmate of Miss Edge's family for some time, and her employer had observed in her intelligence, earnestness, industry, and those traits of character and disposition that go to make a nurse. She had received her education in part at the Indian Training School at Carlisle, Pa., having been placed there by the United States government, as she was an American Indian. She has the features and the figure of her aboriginal ancestors—tall and straight, and had the dignified bearing that characterizes the best specimens of her race. She made a fine record at the school, graduated in 1904, and went west. She married and became Daisy Coddington. Very little was known of her subsequent life until this summer when Miss Gooden received from her an application to have her daughter, Elizabeth, admitted to our training school as a pupil. She has evidently remained loyal to her alma mater and now wishes to send her daughter three thousand miles to be trained at the same school.—HOSPITAL NEWS, WEST CHESTER, PA.

Usually at this time our football squad is just starting to assemble but this year we have already played our first game. We are likely to do the same next fall as tentative arrangements are already made to meet Washington on approximately the same date.

Two full teams were taken to Portland last Saturday to play Washington high and all but one took a hand in holding the husky hatchet men to a 6 to 0 score. Washington, rated high in the Portland Intercollegiate League, was expected to win by a big margin as they had an advantage in weight between 15 and 20 pounds per man as well as many experienced lettermen. On the other hand our team is unusually light and not a regular from last year's team among those present. But nerve, enthusiasm, determination and team spirit coupled with pep, punch, and the ball-hound spirit that our entire squad put into the game made it possible to hold the much heavier and more seasoned Portland organization to a low score. From the time our boys took the field to limber up till they left when the game was over they moved about with an air that meant business. If they can hold their poise and develop a high grade of team spirit and loyalty and are willing to continue to put forth the hard work and energy that is so essential, this year's team should go a long way up the ladder. Their tackling, which was fierce and deadly, was a sight to see and won for them many fine comments. In late years tackling has become almost a lost art because there are so many things to do to round a team into shape that the time required cannot be given to perfect it. But our boys love it and when they tackled a man last Saturday he was tackled and stayed put.

Dowd Franklin was our shining light in the backfield. Alternating at half and fullback he drove through the line for several long gains and on two occasions all but got away. Dowd weighs but 134 pounds but he hits like a ton of brick. He also did our punting and all were good and well placed. Buck Smith, quarterback, handled the team with plenty of good judgment in the selection of his plays and made several nice runs from a fake punt formation. Benedict Hart, a speedy boy from Pipestone, registered a few thrills himself. Once Ben finds himself out in the open he is going to be hard to catch. Wallace Hosie, also from the Pipestone school, is fast. We are hopeful of seeing him get away before many games are played.

Joe Alexander should have been here long before now and also William DePoe. Both of them play end. With those three and the men on hand the end posts should be well taken care of.
