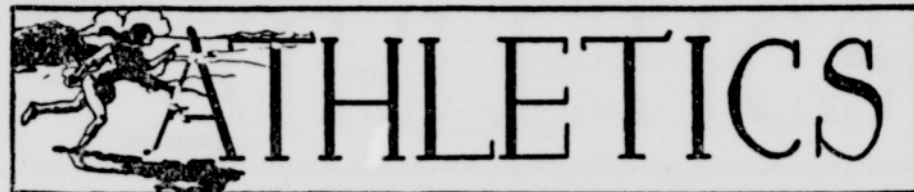
We were pleased to have Mr. J. H. Wagner, Chief of the Alaska Division of the U. S. Bureau of Education, visit our school on Monday. We found him to be a most likeable gentleman who grasped the magnitude and importance of our great institution. He had not the time at his disposal for a visit of length, as business in Seattle, his headquarters, compelled his return home.

Last year Miss Flora Dexter was down from her home in Golovin, Alaska, and attended the State Normal School at Monmouth during the winter, returning home in the summer. Her friends here will be pleased to learn that she has been given a place on the teaching staff at the government school at White Mountain, a short distance from her home. She is also receiving an unusually fine salary.

Up to date there have been canned and put up for winter use 137 gallon cans and 328 quart cans of tomatoes; pears, 32 gallon cans; French prunes (petites), 106 gallons; Italian prunes, 810 gallons; prune butter, 291 quarts. Altogether this totals 1,394 gallons. In addition to the above there have been many gallons of pickles, string beans, etc., put up for our students' tables.
