CHEBUS CHEPAY

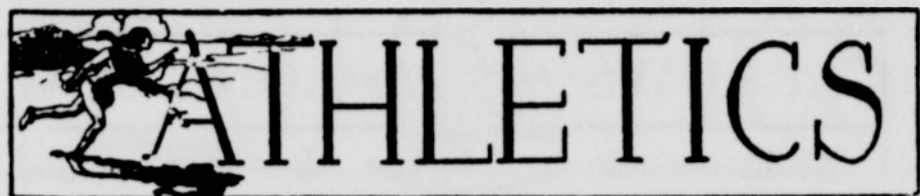
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sands of the beach; Aa-huh-ah slipped, fell and went thundering down—down to those hard white sands!
