When the season closed a year ago we had very vivid pictures of a team of veterans romping onto the field for Chemawa this fall, as only three of a host of regulars were lost through graduation, instead we have only three regulars out in uniform and a new team is slowly but surely shaping itself. The trio around whom the new machine will be built is; Roy Meachem, fullback; Wallace Hosie, left half; and William Jones, right tackle. Those three need no introduction as they were, in a large way, responsible for bringing the Willamette Valley title to Chemawa last year. However, not all of our replacements will be untried men, for a few come from other schools with good records and many of our squad have moved up through the inter-class sports. Aaron Mireau, candidate for guard, from Pipestone, Minnesota, has won letters in all major sports there and is the present holder of the Minnesota scholastic record in the half-mile, which he ran in 2 minutes and 9 seconds. Charles Motschman, who will do the hurling, is already shooting them fast and accurately. Already this combination has started an attack that gives promise of being better than good.

We are blessed with a horde of backfield men this season. Howard Churchill and Grover Sanders cut loose in last Saturday's practice tilt and almost single-handed forced our first string back to the goal line by powerful smashes into the line. During the game Murry McClusky made several nice runs.

For center position we have two big boys in Fred Sandberg and Lonnie Weeks who should take care of that post well. Lyus Walker, a big boy from Idaho, with two years' experience, is a new contender however. We hope to see plenty of action at center this week.

Philip Corbet and Ferdinand Thomas are fast learning the game of ends. Just this week Clifford Case joined the squad and he is lined-up with the rest of the wing men.

John Trottier the first casualty of the season, is once

more out at left half. John has had his ankle in a cast for a few days on account of a sprain received in the first scrimmage of the season. With John back on the field we have a capable relief man for all of our backfield men and the squad has been combed time without number to find an understudy for Motschman at quarterback, but he is still the unknown quantity.

David Little Swallow is just as capable an assistant as he was a center on the team last year. Just recently we learned that David would be ineligible for participation because he had just passed the age limit. Since then he has devoted his energies to developing our line and he puts it across to the boys red hot.
