WINS NATIONAL PRIZE

Some years ago we had enrolled at Chemawa a "wee bit" of a girl from Juneau, Alaska, who was very precocious and who in time became the school pet. In the course of time she returned to her home in Alaska. Just recently she was brought to mind again by a clipping from a Juneau newspaper which set forth that our erstwhile pet was recently a winner in a nation-wide contest. Here is the clipping—read it for yourself:

Frances Orsen, eighth grade pupil in the Juneau elementary public school, is one of nine national first prize winners in the "Our States Project," contest conducted by Current Events, a publication issued by the American Education Press and circulated among all the public schools of the United States and its possessions.

Miss Orsen's subject was "Airplanes in Alaska." It was submitted last month and reads as follows:

"The increasing use of airplanes is an important 'current event' in Alaska. Airplanes were only recently introduced in Juneau, but they have met instant favor for transportation of both passengers and merchandise. Two airplane companies have been formed. One is the Pioneer Airways and the other is the Alaska-Washington airways. Planes of both companies make trips to Seattle, Wash., and back and to near-by towns. They are kept in constant use by business men and for pleasure trips. There have been airplanes up near Fairbanks, but this is really the first time that airplanes have been stationed in Juneau."
