



CHEMAWA BOWS TO SALEM, 14-0

Headed by the band and most all of Chemawa our football team moved on to Salem on Thanksgiving Day as defenders of the Willamette Valley title against Salem high. The 14 to 0 score the Red and Black team rolled up against us tells plainly enough who is now the title holder but nothing of the battle our team put up before relinquishing their grasp at the top of the Willamette Valley football ladder.

By short but consistent gains through the center of our line Salem scored her first touchdown on her first uninterrupted march to our goal line. Several times on the march Salem made her downs just by inches. Sugai went over for the score. Late in the third quarter, with the ball deep in her own territory, like a thunderbolt, Sugai once more crashed the center of our line and this time ran 70 yards before Hosie forced him out of bounds. And on the next breath he went through the same hole for ten more yards and a touchdown. After each touchdown Sugai made a perfect conversion from a placement for the extra point.

As for yardage our back field, Captain Wilder and Wallace Hosie halfbacks, and Roy Meachem, fullback, outshined their opponents. Twice during the first half they moved the ball within scoring distance but each time a bobble denied them the golden touchdown they were so eager to make. Clear out in the open and a pass laid nicely in his hands from the mitt of Motschman, our end dropped the precious oval like a hot apple and away went one of our big opportunities. Just a little later those same three backs shot around the ends and through the line from mid-field till Salem's defense was standing almost on their own goal line and when it appeared that a touchdown was certain a fumble occurred in our backfield and another golden egg was lost. The first half came to a close with the score 7 to 0 just as it did a year ago.

Chuck full of pep and determination our eleven took the field in the second half and appeared to be on their way to a flock of touchdowns but one break after another checked their marches goalward. Right off the reel, behind a perfectly formed formation, Meachem carried the ball from his own line on the kick-off to the forty-yard line and then broke out into the open and was finally brought down on the fifty yard line by the last and final tackler just when he appeared to be away. The next play netted a nice big gain but it was lost through a fifteen-yard penalty. A little later, after carrying the ball deep into Salem's territory and a score seemed certain a fumble occurred and another

opportunity went shimmering. So went the ball game and with it went the Willamette Valley title to the victors.

Even in defeat our team looked like champions. They executed play after play that netted them yardage and thrilled the spectators. Their fake punts, triple and lateral passes worked nicely and always for something.

It was the last game for Captain Wilder and he turned in a fine afternoon's work, as did Hosie and Meachem. "Biff" Jones, line captain, played a fine game and Miller, his end, also contributed much both offensively and defensively. On the other side were Thompson, tackle, and Vivette and Case, ends, and they were equally as tough for Salem to handle. Though Salem scored through the center of our line, Weeks, center; Archambeau and Churchill are deserving of much credit for the game they played against much heavier opponents. Considering that this is the first season for all three of them they did remarkably well.

All-Stars 13, Hot Shots 13, was the way the last real battle of our football season ended last week. Edgar Simmons, Joe Ball and Elmer Cline, hard plunging All-Star backfield, went through the center of the Hot Shot line by short but consistent gains for their scores. Elusive little Orville Olney was the big star of the Hot-Shot backfield.
