



TRACKSTERS TRIUMPH IN TRIANGULAR MEET

We would like to elaborate on the success of our track team in its initial triangular meet held here last Friday between Salem, Silverton and Chemawa, and which ended quite comfortably in our favor as follows: Chemawa, 62; Salem, 49; Silverton, 14. Only in a scant few instances did the victors win handily and for the greater part every event was of the nip-and-tuck type that gave the large crowd in attendance the thrill they looked for. The 880-relay—the last number on the program—was a fitting event to bring to a close the program of track and field events. The race was a classic and to the spectators was a howling success. Two of our own boys battled it out for high point honors. Albert Miller, one of our leading track men the last couple of seasons, won this honor with a total of 18 1-4 points. Peter Emmons was a very close second with 16 1-4. While such regulars as Albert Miller, Howard Churchill, Warren Wilder and George Pepion were prominent figures in the outcome of the meet, the work of our new track stars, Peter Emmons, David Little Swallow, Peter Levay and Ira Booth was none the less brilliant.
