



CHEMAWA LOSES OPENER TO WASHINGTON

Saturday evening saw the first football game of the 1931 season with Chemawa and Washington as opponents. Washington won the game, 6-0, only after a hard, grueling fight, scoring late in the fourth quarter with but three minutes left to play. At this point in the game Chemawa seemed to be about to gain possession of the ball again when Washington, kicking on their fourth down, got a "break" when Chemawa was penalized for holding, giving their opponents the ball with a first down. Even then Chemawa held their own until a short pass put the ball on about the two-foot line and was bucked over for six points.

Chemawa was on the defense most of the game, due to the fact that Washington had such a heavy, experienced line. It was the first time in the history of Washington that she had all lettermen for every position on the team. Their line averaged over 180 pounds from end to end compared to about 150 for Chemawa. Chemawaites can rightfully claim a moral victory by holding this huge, strong, seasoned team to a 6-0 score and should feel mighty proud of their representatives on the field.

The first three quarters were successions of drives by Washington until Chemawa tightened up and punted out of danger. Vivette's kicking was far better than Washington's. He punted several long, high punts but most of them were so placed that they went out of bounds, thus stopping opponents from running them back.

Hoptowit and Weeks were outstanding on the line, making tackle after tackle, with Meachen, acting captain, playing a good game both defensively and offensively in the backfield. This stout little fellow made some of the giant Washingtonians grunt not a little. All the boys played gallantly against such a much heavier team.

The cultivation and harvesting of crops at Chemawa represents activities along several distinct lines—each of considerable magnitude.
