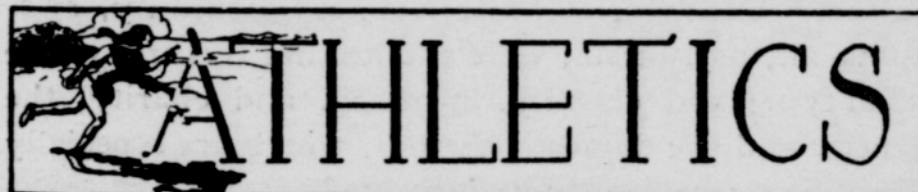

**CHEMAWA DROPS ANOTHER**

Linfield College sent their first string varsity football squad to Chemawa Saturday afternoon and left in the evening with the long end of a 6-2 score.

Chemawa seemed to have the best of the argument in the first half, although both teams played rather ragged football. The Linfield team was the heavier, relying mainly on power plays for advancing the ball. The score for Linfield came early in the second half when they obtained a first down after a completed pass and a short run, on the one-yard line. They bucked it over for six points on the third down. Chemawa's two points should have been at least twelve. On the first opportunity to score we lacked the punch to really put it across the line and the opponents obtained the ball. In their attempt to kick, the punter evidently thought the ball was an egg to hatch, for he promptly squatted down upon it to await events. The events came immediately in the form of a horde of Chemawa braves jumping on him. This was our only score although some thought the ball was about two feet over the line in Chemawa's last drive.

All in all, the game was not one of smoothness but did have some thrills despite its raggedness.
