



CHEMAWA BEATS SALEM 7-2

After a slight slump Chemawa's braves came back to defeat the strong Salem high school team. Chemawa outfought them from start to finish. Receiving the opening kickoff the Braves ran and passed to the Cherrians' 25 yard-line and a short punt was grounded for a touchback. Salem was held and forced to punt, which was bad and gave Chemawa her much-needed chance to score. This was done on a short pass from Thomas to Emmons. Sugai, the much heralded man wonder from Salem, was indeed a sorry looking back on Chemawa's passes. When Sugai came close to the line to back it up Thomas passed over him to either Olney, Churchill, Vivette or Emmons and when Sugai backed up to knock down passes the backfield ran through the line or around ends for large gains.

Franklin was out for the season and Meachem, Churchill, Olney and Iyall in the backfield, and Vivette, Hoptowit, John, Birdbear and Archambeau in the line, were all nursing injuries. Some of the above never even saw action in the Oregon City game.

SUPT. CONSER HAS PASSED ON

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Washington, D. C., Mr. Conser found time to study in the National Law College there. He later passed his bar examination, but never practiced, although he frequently had occasion to put his learning to good use in government service.

In 1905 he married Alethea Hurley, with whom he became acquainted in Washington, and who, with the two sons, Frank, Jr., 21, and Walter, 14, survives him.

Before coming to Riverside Mr. Conser spent several years in field service work for the Indian Service. He also served as chief clerk under Indian Commissioner Leupp during Roosevelt's administration. His work as chief clerk occupied him until he was transferred to Riverside to take charge of Sherman Institute in 1909.

None but a few of his more intimate friends realize the extent of the development at this institute, for which Mr. Conser was directly responsible. Somewhat hampered by limited apportionments for the school, the late superintendent faced the task of development with unfailing courage. Since 1910 expenditures for improvements at Sherman have totaled but \$162,626.98, whereas, if they had been built by contract, the total cost would have reached \$428,640.64. Practically all of this saving was made possible by Mr. Conser's foresight and hard work.
