



CHEMAWA BEATS LINFIELD FRESHMEN

Chemawa Dec 9. Chemawa's quintet opened its season with a decisive victory over the freshmen from Linfield. Chemawa chalked up 17 points each half, making a total of 34 points to 12 points for Linfield. The freshmen made but four points the first half and they were all on fouls. In the second half they fared better, with three field goals and two free throws. C. Wouriveur was their high point man, with five points to his credit.

Chemawa started the scoring early and kept a steady pace all through the game. Vivette was the outstanding floor man, and also totaled twelve points for his team. Hatfield came next with eight. The game was fast from start to finish. There were no chances for set floor plays or slow offenses. Considering the speed of the game it was exceptionally clean and free from fouls. Cadwell called enough fouls to keep the players in line, yet not making the game uninteresting.

Chemawa has her next scheduled game on Dec. 18 with the strong Oregon City High School team. The game is to be played in the new Chemawa gymnasium. The floor of the new gym, being made of cedar blocks, is turning out to be one of the best, if not the best, floors in this section of the country.
