VALLEY INSTRUCTORS MEET AT CHEMAWA

Prominent members of the Willamette Valley Vocational Instructors met at Chemawa on the evening of Thursday, Jan. 21st. Some thirty members were served a dinner at the domestic science department by Miss Strauch and her class, after which a business meeting was held in the employes' club room. Mr. O. D. Adams, state director of vocational education, made the principal address of the evening on legislation now before congress. George B. Cox of the Industrial Arts department of Oregon State College, suggested solutions for problems that arise in the industrial arts and in vocational instruction. Supt. Ryan spoke on the plans and aims of the vocational training program at this school. All in attendance experienced a most enjoyable and profitable evening.
