CHEMAWA BEATS UNIVERSITY HIGH 33-28

The Indians staged a comeback after a period of basketball coma due to the "flu." This game was one of the most highly enjoyed of the season, for it was close throughout and was not a rough affair. The University high boys were thorough sportsmen and we hope that more contests can be arranged under such friendly conditions.

The Eugene boys started out with a lead, due to beautiful shooting by McAllister, who by the way, was high point man of the game, with 20 points, but Chemawa soon caught up, mainly because the opponents could not perfect a defense for Chemawa's style of play. Russell Bobb caused them not a little trouble by hiding out in the corners and just when they forgot him a pass would come down and he had time for "all night" shots. Chemawa's players all contributed to the scoring, Bobb with 12; Vivette 7; Thomas 6; Hatfield 6; and DePoe 4. This is a new line-up for Chemawa.

Poor passing was evident, but it is believed that with more practice it will improve greatly.

The champion class B team added another to their credit by trouncing the Deaf School 30-17. The first half was poorly played with only half-hearted efforts by each team. Although the score was close at half time, 11-12 favoring the deaf, Chemawa steadily forged ahead in the last periods and showed some of their clever, short passes for which they are now famed.

Chemawa plays McMinnville there next Friday.
