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Supt. Byron J. Brophy has installed a commercial course at Flandreau. The course includes two years of work and trains students in bookkeeping, shorthand, typewriting, business English and office management. It is a popular course being filled to capacity and having a large waiting list.

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The three lower grades were eliminated at the Genoa (Neb.) school this year, we learn from the *Indian News*. The grades run from fourth to twelfth inclusive. Enrollment in the upper grades has naturally increased. Great care was taken and considerable time spent this fall in placing the students, both in the academic and vocational departments.

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Wrangell Institute, a U. S. Indian School in Wrangell Alaska, opened its doors on October 2 with Mr. Leroy Jackson as director. Grades from the sixth through the twelfth are taught and strict academic, physical and moral conduct requirements are maintained. The capacity of the school is limited to 80 students at present. Pupils are enabled to work their way through school through a plan similar to the one in use here at Chemawa.

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The Sherman Institute band did itself proud at the Los Angeles County Fair, being acclaimed by the throngs who attended the fair and praised by the Fair officials. The band and its director, D. Ray Campbell, was the subject of a good article in the *Riverside Press*. 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Several new pieces of equipment have been added to Haskell Institute's commercial department. Seven new adding machines, a bookkeeping machine and a calculator are the latest additions. Some revision will be made in the course of study to meet the changes in the industrial and commercial world. Haskell has had unusual success in placing her commercial graduates and this is partly due to the fact that she has kept up with the world in equipment and teaching methods.
