



### CHEMAWA WINS HOLIDAY GAMES

December 23, the Chemawa Redskins scalped the Silverfoxes 47-39 in one of the best and most exciting contests ever seen on the local court. This win partially avenged two defeats of last year and gave us an early lead in the W. V. I. A. conference.

The Indians jumped into an early lead and were ahead 22-16 at the half. In the second half Silverton began hitting the hoop regularly and tied us 39-39 with only a minute and a half left to play but Hatfield's two free throws at this time started the fireworks and three baskets in rapid succession, two by Vivette and one by Pratt, made the final score 47-39.

L. Vivette, Hatfield, I. Shoulderblade, Dogeagle, Pratt and Amera all played the game of their lives and it would be hard to pick a star. Hatfield with 26 and Vivette with 13 were high point men.

Our "B" team walloped the Silverton "B" 48-26. Chemawa was at no time in danger of being overtaken. Luke Markishtum and Gale Bobb were high point men with 14 and 8 points respectively.

Chemawa easily defeated Dallas high's basketball team 49-26 on the home court December 29. This was a non-conference practice tilt.

Chemawa's first string and Dallas gave an exhibition of slam bang basketball in the first half with Chemawa holding the upper hand to lead by 27-17 at half time. The reserves entered the game in the last half and gave the crowd a real treat in the way of a careful, fast and short passing game. Great defensive work permitted Dallas only 4 goals in this half.

Vivette and Sam Shoulderblade carried off high point honors with 16 and 10 points respectively.

The "B" team had quite a tussle with the Dallas bunch but managed to come out on the long end of a 37-21 score. Luke Markishtum was again high point man with 20 points.

Molalla was defeated at Molalla in Chemawa's second league game on Dec. 30. The local sharpshooters, at no time in danger of being overtaken, were leading at the half 25-7. The game was quite rough. Sam Shoulderblade left the game on personal fouls. Coach Lavelle used his rapidly developing crew of subs again very effectively to relieve the regulars. Hatfield with 12 and Zundle and Vivette with 8 points each lead the scorers.

The "B" team continued its string of victories by winning a close game from the Molalla "B"s 19-13. Gale Bobb and Les Jefferson were high point men with 8 and 4 points respectively.
