## BASKETBALL AND WRESTLING IN LIMELIGHT

January 5, Chemawa added the Portland champions, Benson Tech, to their list of victories. Final score: Chemawa 39, Benson 21.

Both teams played a defensive game in the first half with the Indians leading 14-7 at half time. The local sharp shooters got the range in the second half and never were in danger of being overtaken. Benson showed very fine ball handling and floor work and had numerous shots at the basket but most of their shots were hurried by the Indian guards. Hatfield and "Ambrose" Dogeagle were high scorers with 9 and 8 points respectively.

January 10, at Portland, Washington high was out to revenge themselves for the 55-26 routing handed them by Chemawa earlier in the season here, but when the timers gun ended the game they were on the short end of a 43-29 score.

Washington's low-ceilinged gym gave the Indians quite a bit of trouble in the first half and at several times Washington tied with them. The half ended 19-14 in favor of Chemawa. In the second half Hatfield gave an accurate exhibition of shooting by scoring 13 of his 21 points.

This win marked Chemawa's fifth consecutive victory over Portland teams this current season.

To make competition keener Coach Lavelle has offered a trophy to the class winning the basket ball tournament this year. To date, the juniors have victories over the sophomores and seniors. In the junior high division the freshies have a victory over the seventh graders.

The wrestlers showed good form in winning 7 matches out of 12 from Salem high: two matches resulted in draws. Kodiak Mueller, Dumont, George Pepion, Iron Moccasin, Underwood, and Whitefeather gave the best exhibitions. Others participating were: Courtney, Olney, Demmert, Roy Pepion, Stanhope and Palmer. A return match will be held in Salem soon. D. Matt handled the referee assignment very efficiently.

The All-stars finally were able to schedule a game and took on last year's independent champions, the Dallas town team. After a rough and tumble exhibition of basket ball, Dallas managed to win by a score of 30-28. "Spooks" Dogeagle was high point man with 9 points. A return game will be scheduled in the near future and the All-stars have high hopes of winning as Matt has returned to school.

Chemawa basketeers had a field day against Woodburn on Thursday last. The boys from the "berry center" barely saved themselves from a shut-out in the first half by scoring ten seconds before the gun. The first half score was 36-2 in Chemawa's favor. The score at the end of the game was Chemawa 73, Woodburn 12. Hatfield lead the scorers with 15 points. Amera was next with 12.
