Tuesday, January 31, Chemawa lost both games to Oregon City high. The varsity was defeated 25 to 21. Dogeagle, Pratt and S. Shoulderblade each made four points in this game. Our B team took a 24-16 drubbing. Markishtum connected with the rim for 8 points.
