Myrtle Creek was the opposing team that night and although they made a gallant effort the Redskins overran them, 42 to 21. Captain Ike Shoulderblade was high point man with 12 points.

The next night, Feb. 1, the squad arrived in Ashland to do battle with their pale-faced friends of that city. History repeated itself that night when the Ashland quintet defeated our stalwarts for the second time this season by one point, the final score being 31-30. Sam Shoulderblade counted for 16 of the Redskins' points.

After another day on the highway the Chemawa team arrived at Medford for a two game series. Medford is one of our traditional rivals—a friendly foe but one which we take great delight in defeating. On this occasion our fondest hopes were realized when our boys put forth a supreme effort, outcharging and outsmarting their pear-picking rivals to win by the score of 28-23. Isaac Shoulderblade and Wallace Zundle each accounted for 9 points.

The next night, in the second game, the pear-pickers staged a complete reversal of form and upset the Indians cart, 28-12. Wallace Zundle was high man with 8 points.
