



### CHEMAWA HUMBLER PACIFIC COLLEGE

In what we called a home coming here last Friday, "the golden brown children of the sun" took the giant Pacific College boys to camp in a nip-and-tuck battle. The only score of the game came in the first few minutes of play when a punt booted by the redskin full-back, Nuckolls, was recovered on the college boy's goal line, giving Chemawa a touchback. Chemawa is scheduled to meet Salem high school Saturday night. This is one of Chemawa's best rivals and the game ought to be a good one. The last game played was two years ago when Chemawa was defeated 7-0. The game will be played under the arc lights of Sweetland field at Salem.
