### SUMMARY OF BRONSON TESTS

James Kelly has made remarkable achievement having earned a college freshman percentile of 97 on the psychological examination and one of 87 on the cooperative English test. His 12th grade rating on the total score of the English examination was 92 and on the vocabulary section alone 99. It was the usage section of this test in which he obtained the lowest score, but even on this test he ranks above the mediam for 12th grade students. His are the highest scores which we have yet recorded for an Indian student.

Although James Kelly has taken first place on the two examinations there are many students who have obtained superior scores on all or some parts of the tests. There are in all on each examination seven scores which are higher than the norm which represents the mediam for college freshman; four students have surpassed the college freshman mediam on both examinations.
