### GREAT SPIRIT BLESSES BRAVES WITH VICTORIES

#### Highly Tooted Camas Hi Team Falls Prey to Chemawa

On Friday, Oct. 30, Coach "Lefty" Wilder and his Indian football aggregation journeyed to Camas, Washington to play the highly tooted Camas Hi team.

This was Chemawa's first inter-state clash in many years and the Indians were up against a powerful team.

Camas was rated forty-seven points better than the Indians because of their twenty seven to nothing victory over Salem Hi. The Vikings in turn defeated the Redskins by the overwhelming score of twenty to nothing, but figures meant nothing to the Warriors who were out after a scalp.

The game started promptly at 8:00 P.M. The Redskins chose to receive. On the opening kickoff, Gerald Smith took the ball on his own ten and ran it back to Chemawa's forty-five. The Indians then began a determined march down the field that netted them five first downs. They were stopped on the Camas five yard line. On a pair of double reverses, Gigler, Camas left half, brought the ball from his own five to the Chemawa forty five yard line. The game from then on to the half was hard fought, although Chemawa threatened the Camas goal, the ball was on the Camas five yard line when the gun went off.

The second half was just a few minutes old when the Washingtonians capitalized on a break, scored their first touchdown. The try for point was good. This seemed only to make the Indians fight that much harder, for on the second kickoff, Matt Adams made the longest run of the season, when he dashed eighty yards for a touchdown. The extra point was good. This ended the scoring for the third quarter.

The climax of the game came in the final quarter when Camas made their last touchdown. The try for extra point failed. The Warriors then began to get hot with Smith and Adams sparking the off-

ense. The Redskins tallied twice, but failed to make one extra point. The final score read Chemawa 19 - Camas 13.

### LEBANON'S UNDEFEATED ELEVEN BEATEN BY FIGHTING INDIANS

The Chemawa Indians ran wild on October 23, to hand Coach Reed Clark's Berrypickers their first defeat of the season, 20 to 0.

The braves, lead by Halfback Gerald Smith, scored in the first three quarters. 'Smithy,' who consistently tore through the Lebanon line for long gains, dashed 40 yards on a spinner play for the first touchdown in the opening period and added the second with a five yard line plunge in the second quarter.

Adams, right half, scooted around left end on a reverse from Smith to run 18 yards for the brave's final touchdown in the third period. Sanderville, right end, made good two out of three place kicks for the extra point.

The defeat ended the hopes of Lebanon, which last week defeated Covallis, 7 to 0, for a clean season slate.

### ARMISTICE DAY GRID BATTLE PROVES FATAL TO TOLEDO

In the third victory to go on record Chemawa returned home Armistice day with a 27 to 13 victory over Toledo high.

The Indians gained a 13 to 0 lead in the first half when Saluskin went over on a line buck and Adams dashed 45 yards to pay dirt.

George 'Fletcher' Christian 'Gable,' burly lad from Poplar, Montana, did one of those rare things when he rushed through the line to succeed in recovering a blocked punt behind the goal line for one of Chemawa's scores.

His teammates said he "hun" on to it like a package of "pemmican" from the reservation.
