TUBERCULOSIS MOVIE PRESENTED AT CHAPEL

Representative of Marion County Health Association Interprets Pictures

On Sunday, December 13, the students were very fortunate in having a representative of the Marion County Health Association here at Chemawa. This lady spoke on tuberculosis and then showed a moving picture on the same subject. She emphasized the fact that tuberculosis was a disease that could be wiped out completely as other similar diseases had been. To do this it would be necessary to have the cooperation of every human.

The first thing that the picture revealed was that tuberculosis started from a living germ, and if it were not taken care of it would steadily increase. This picture also showed the different ways that this disease could be picked up by those that have it. By showing these examples it was proved that tuberculosis is not an inherited disease but it is a contagious one for tuberculin germs are carried on anything that touches the lips of the consumptive.

It is now possible to have tuberculin tests in the schools to discover the disease in its early stage. By finding it when it first begins, it can be cured. It is believed that in a few more years it will be possible to stamp out this dreadful disease entirely.

The speaker stated that every person can help in this campaign by buying Christmas seals. The money that is collected makes it possible to have sanatoriums to take care of the victims of this dreadful plague.
