DR. BRUCE BAXTER EFFECTIVELY PORTRAYS LINCOLN'S LIFE FROM CHILDHOOD TO THE PRESIDENCY

After several weeks without chapel here because of the flu, the Sunday evening programs were resumed last Sunday night in the auditorium. The program was opened with the usual ceremony of saluting the flag. This was followed by several musical selections by the choir and the orchestra.

George Christian, student chairman, introduced Dr. Bruce Baxter, President of Willamette University, as speaker. Dr. Baxter spoke on the "Life of Lincoln," and emphasized the fact that Lincoln was born in a log cabin and suffered many heartaches and hardships in his early youth and in later life. They were as follows: the death of his mother, the death of the girl he was engaged to, his failure as a captain in war, failure in the store business, his failure as a surveyor, failure in his first political attempt, and many other disappointments which this great man experienced. He became President of the United States during the Civil War.

Dr. Baxter related an incident that happened a few summers ago while traveling with a baseball team in Japan. He asked some of the Japanese boys this question: "What do you think about

Mr. Beebe was accompanied on his trip through Africa by two women, his wife and Wonga, an African. While in Africa he found another companion, a monkey which he called Shemawa. The explorers were guarded and accommodated by twelve African natives.

Among some of the interesting things Mr. Beebe told about were the customs and habits of the natives of Africa. One of the strange customs which he related to us was their method of doctoring by bleeding. These wounds made by bleeding are filled with sand and made to appear very artistic. Some of these designs were illustrated by pictures. He also said that there were three thousand ways by which one may get married, but not one way to get a divorce.

One of the customs which Mr. Beebe thought quite striking was the fact that the women do all the work. He readily found that most of the boys agreed with him on the advantages of this.

While in Africa, Mr. Beebe had many narrow escapes such as being attacked by army ants and elephants.

Mr. Beebe illustrated his interesting talk with pictures of African animals, scenery and natives.
