The Chemawa Indians defeated the Silverton High School basketball team last Monday night by a score of 30 to 23 on Chemawa's floor.

The game was fast and hard fought during the entire four periods. Chemawa lead in the first half until the final minutes when Cross of Silverton put his team in the lead. The score was 15 to 13.
