Real professionalism was shown in the main event when Connie Mail, one of the cleverest battlers to don mitts for the Chemawa tribe, defeated Frank Cerney, Portland contender for the Boston A.A.U. tournament.

Henry Champine, local boy, is well known in the valley and the Rose City for the uncouth way which he handles his opponents. His man did not appear and he easily defeated a substitute, Ray Goldman.

Gale Bobb, new find in the fight game, made a surprise attack on the white man, Ace Heinz, popular Multnomah Club battler, and lost a "boo" decision in a hard grueling fight.
