### SOUVENIRS, EXHIBITS, PLANNED BY DEPARTMENTS FOR VISITORS

All the shops are kept busy, not only with their daily work orders, but also with the preparation for the Chemawa Indian Celebration. The gala event which is to be on the following dates, May 31 and June 1.

#### PAINT SHOP

Mentioning particularly the paint shop, under the supervision of Mr. Warren Wilder, the paint shop boys are making a huge Totem pole. The measurements are: 31 feet in height, the diameter at the top being 22 inches, and 24 inches at the bottom.

Upon its completion the Totem pole is to be placed at the northeast corner of the intersection, across the road from what the students call "Kick-back," located on the main highway about a mile east of the Chemawa school campus.

#### LEATHER CRAFT

An Indian village, is planned and the set-up will be under the supervision of Mr. G. E. DeCorah, the instructor of leather craft and shoe repairing.

The work done in the leather-craft department has been under the able supervision and instructions of Mr. G. E. DeCorah. Various designs have been put on the leather goods that have been made. Such as, key cases, book-ends, book markers, and belts.

#### BARBER SHOP

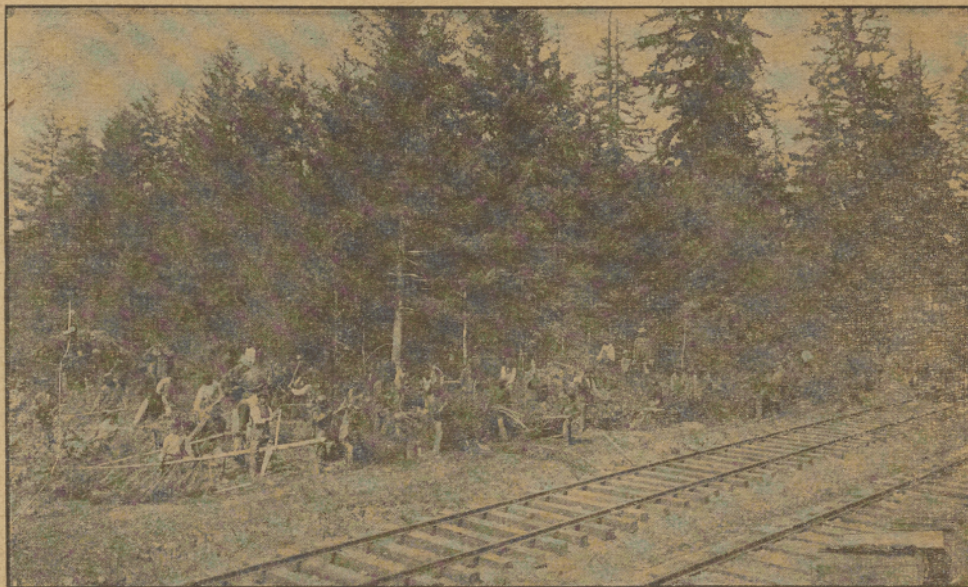
The senior barbers are aiming to do a big business during the celebration. The barber shop will be open throughout the big event.

#### KITCHEN

#### HOME ECONOMICS

The home economics department will hold open house in Hawley hall Monday morning from eight until eleven thirty o'clock during the Celebration.

The foods laboratories and dining room located on the first floor will offer displays of cooked foods, table setting, and foods canned at the Chemawa cannery.

In addition, there will be a cooking demonstration during which visitors may have a chance to "sample" the food.

An exhibit of beadwork, blockprint, weaving, and art needlework will be shown in the Arts and Crafts room on the second floor.

The nursery playroom will be open to visitors and will also contain a display of homemade furniture and toys made from boxes and scrap lumber by the girls in the household furnishings class.
