CHEMAWA VICTORIOUS IN FIRST HOOP GAMES

Boxers Punch Their Way Through Several Battles

On Wednesday, Dec. 1, Chemawa journeyed to Canby to open the basketball season.

Canby started swiftly and it looked as though the Indians were in a fair way to lose their scalps. But captain Bud Archambeau and that lanky Alaskan lad Frank Bolton found their shooting eyes and the team forged into the lead.

They were never headed and won easily by a score of 48 to 22.

Little Buddy Archambeau played his usual brilliant game and the opponents could not check him.

Frank Bolton starred by sinking 16 counters.

The Indians led by Frank "Flash" Bolton overwhelmed Turner here Friday December 3 in a lopsided game.

With Bolton wielding the brush to the tune of 30 points the squad posted a 72 to 31 win.

The two new men, Frank Bolton and Henry Scalpcane, have done the lions share of the work so far with Scalpcane's snappy passes and Bolton's eye the team should make the state tournament this year.

The second string paced by Forrest "Chico" Norton also won easily. This is Norton's first year and has been high point man, scoring 31 points in two games. This is the "B" team's second win also as they scored 43 points to the opponents 11.

In a thrilling game at Salem, Dec. 3, the Chemawa All-Stars lost a hard game to General Finance, last year's champs.

The Indians proved worthy foes to the ex-college stars when they lead through a large part of the games.

Sam Shoulderblade swished the net for 11 counters and high point honors for Chemawa while Peron Oveville, lanky

center for Finance, hit the basket for 16 points.

The game was hard fought throughout and the outcome was in doubt until the final minutes of the game when General Finance staged a rally to put the game on ice.

The All-Stars won their second start Monday, December 6, against the Mathi's Roofers of Salem.

Led by Captain Alvin Amera who tallied 19 points for his evenings work, the All-Stars won the thriller from Salem by a score of 52 to 44.

Although Sam Shoulderblade didn't get high point honors he played the best floor game seen here for many a moon. Single handed he time and again took the ball from the opponents and finally emerged with 11 points. Petty James, starting guard, was unable to play because of a couple of dislocated fingers in the Finance game.

On Friday, November 12, the Chemawa boxers went to Gresham, Ore., to box the Oregon Athletic Club, and after all the battles were over Chemawa had won 4 bouts and lost 2.

Dan Snipe a new man, outpointed his opponent to win the nod after three rounds of milling.

Irving Dowd gave his man a boxing lesson for three rounds and won the decision easily.

Johnny Cobell, Chemawa's "Fighting Sheik" won the decision over Frank Jarvis in a hair-raising bout.

Vernon Jackson lost by a technical K.O. to Ace Heintz, veteran O.A.C. featherweight.

Roy Pepion won a decision over Dale Bernard after three furious rounds of mixing.

Sam Shoulderblade lost a decision to Frank Cerny O.A.C.

On December 6 three members of the school boxing team went to St. Helens, Oregon, and after eleven torrid rounds of glove tossing the trio emerged victorious.

Mat Mireau won a decision over Art Anderson, St. Helens, after three grueling rounds.

Glenn Black, "Indian Fighter," won a decision over Al Galahad after three hectic rounds which kept the local fight fans on their feet through out the entire fight.

Charlie Owens punched out a five round decision over Jimmy Merrill, O.A.C. featherweight, in the main-event.

The teams which presented a united front to opponents all year formed two war parties, Thanksgiving Day, and attacked each other on the gridiron.

All morning they pushed and slipped up and down the field only to tie 7 to 7. As this didn't settle the matter they decided to carry the war on to the basketball court. So in the afternoon the "River Rats" sunk the "Mud hens" by a score of 15 to 7. So the losers gracefully but not so tunelessly sang "Home on the Range" at the student's dance.

Connie Mail and Glenn Black, Chemawa's representative, in the recent Golden Gloves tournament held in Seattle, returned. They didn't get a championship but they returned with part of it. Connie Mail recieved a silver medal and a bathrobe as he was runner-up in his division. Glenn Black was eliminated the first night where he lost a decision to the boy who later won the championship.

On November 29, the Indian fighters clashed with Multnomah Athletic Club in the school Gym and won 4 out of 7 matches.
