Varsity Loses First League Game To Dallas

At the close of the first half race the All-Stars emerged from the smoke of battle with four wins and one defeat to win the top rating.

They were only defeated by General Finance, last years champions, in the first game. They were not fully organized and, as later performances indicate, improved rapidly. Two other teams defeated the "Money-men" and in turn humbled by the "Racers."

The Varsity lost their first league game in three starts at Dallas on January 11.

Dallas proved too strong on their home court for the Braves. Chemawa played good ball all through the game but Dallas jumped into the lead at the start of the game and was never headed, although the fighting Braves tied them once.

Diminutive "Jelly Jackson" sparked the Indians attack as he dropped in 6 field goals and a free throw to total 13 points and lead both teams in scoring. At the final whistle the score stood 35 to 30 in favor of Dallas.

January 4, the Braves mounted their ponies and declared hoop-war on West Linn on their own stomping grounds. The occasion was the opening game of the WVI League.
