WVI LEAGUE CHAMPS UPSET BY CHEMAWA

Bulldog's 23 Straight Victories Broken by Braves

A cocky, overconfident, previously undefeated defenseless bunch of Woodburn Bulldogs cracked wide open here Tuesday night as a thundering herd of racing Redskins literally poured over them to score a 45-27 victory and end the WVI league season in a blaze of glory.

Not the least bit over-awed by the impressive string of 23 straight wins hung up by the Bulldogs, the Chemawa Indians started from scratch and ran the former until they sneaked off the floor with their tails literally between their legs.

Chemawa's win annexed third place in the final standings for the Redmen, but had no affect on Woodburn's championship status other than breaking that long winning streak of 23 tilts.

In a bedlam WVI league donny-brook here last Friday night that took two overtime periods to decide, big Linn, the Hopster pivoter, tucked in the winning basket to give Coach Loren Mort's Independence team a 33-31 victory.

It was 29-all at the end of the regulation playing time, and Track for Chemawa, and Linn for Independence each scored in the first overtime period to

deadlock the count at the end of it at 31 all.

On the very first play of the second overtime, Linn boomed in to tilt in the only points scored for that period.

On Tuesday Feb. 7, the strong Dallas team came here for a league game. They were holding second place until Chemawa trounced them to the tune of 44-40 to take second place in the WVI league. The game had students and employee's alike standing up and screaming. The lead changed hands several times until Archambeau and Redelk sewed it up.

In a repetition of the first game Silverton again defeated the Indians there on Feb. 12.

The score was tied at the end of the regular playing period 27 all, and again Pettyjohn proved poison as he converted Bolton's foul into the winning point in the overtime period.

Eight Indian scrappers journeyed to Portland Thursday night and took five out of eight matches from the strong Multnomah club.
