

Norton Elected Studentbody President

A Summary of Events Which Have Transpired

THE first meeting of the students was held on Sept. 29, to elect officers for the student council. The students considered various candidates and elected the following to the Council offices: President, Forrest Norton; Vice-President, Marjorie Matheson; Secretary, Henry Arnoux; Publicity Chairman, Pressley LaBreche; Program Chairman, Adam Beareub.

The next assembly was called by President Norton on Oct. 6. Mr. George P. LaVatta, a visitor on the campus and also the speaker, was introduced to the assembly by Adam Beareub of the program committee, who had arranged for Mr. LaVatta to speak to the students.

Mr. LaVatta gave the students a very interesting talk on the opportunities that a student has here at Chemawa if one would only take advantage of them. He said that leadership is needed very much on various reservations and he also stated that this is the place where it should be developed and practiced.

On Wednesday, October 12, another meeting was called to order by the President. The guest speaker for the occasion was Mr. Allen Hulsizer, from Washington D.C. His talk was very important and interesting to the student body, as it pertained to the school spirit of this institution. He said he didn't seem to see very much school spirit here and that we should do something to make every one more enthusiastic in every thing that is undertaken. He stated that the Literary Societies was a good step toward the advancement of the school if the societies are active as the students are planning to make them.

The following day the Student Council held a meeting in Winona hall at 7 o'clock. At this meeting there was an open discussion on the proposed social hour program which is quite the issue at present.

On October 16, a general assembly was called to order to discuss this plan, which would allow them more social freedom if practiced right. Supt. Jackson said he would consider the student's proposal and would also discuss the plan at a meeting with the faculty.

As a result of the faculty meeting, Supt.

Jackson held a meeting with the Student Council to inform them that this plan would be tried on a small scale, perhaps, in the near future.

Suggested for Indian Schools

THE Educational Division has issued, in attractive format, a list of suggested books for Indian schools. The list is divided into three principal sections: books for the younger pupils, through the sixth grade; books for the older pupils, through the high school; books for adults teachers, advisers, principals, social workers, etc. There is also a brief section on encyclopedias, dictionaries and atlases; and one on magazines and newspapers. Each reference is followed by concise bibliographical data and by a brief comment.
