INDIAN LEGEND

THE famous Salmon River gold rush, and the settlement of future Idaho, were given impetus when an old prospector heard a Nez Perce Indian say: "One night, with two of my people, I slept in a canyon, deep and dark. High in one of the rocky sides, we saw an eye of light. It watched us all night. In the morning we looked for it. It was fast in the rock. We could not move it. It was great medicine, and we left it there." The gold hunter spent years of searching for that "eye of light." Although his search was a fruitless one, it nevertheless heralded the opening of the golden trail to Idaho and the later development of that State.
