

Cannery Terminates Successful Season

ON October 19th, the Chemawa cannery, which has been in operation since last July under Mr. O'Reilly, finished canning the last fruits and vegetables for the season and ceased operation.

During these months the cannery was in operation 8700 cans of fruits and vegetables were canned. These cans contain mainly: blackberries, young berries, prunes, rhubarb, plums, peaches, cherries, swiss chard, corn, beets, carrots, and tomatoes. Mr. O'Reilly's cannery crew also canned 1100 cans of tomato juice.

In addition to the canning of the fruits and vegetables listed above, 7530 cans of salmon were canned for the Celilo Indians. To pay for the cost of canning the salmon for these Indians, the school kept one-fourth of this total and the balance of the canned salmon was sent to the various Indian families. Forty-four Indian families had their food supply increased in this way.

While the cannery was in operation, 174 high school girls assisted in the canning process and received no pay for their services. Mr. O'Reilly has expressed his appreciation for their cooperation in getting this work done, and the school appreciates the work of these girls who have made it possible for these fruits and vegetables to be served in their dining hall during the year.

Besides the fruits that were canned in the Chemawa cannery two tons of prunes from our orchards were dried in Salem.

After the cannery closed, the 174 high school girls were surprised when they were told they would be given a trip to the coast, and are now waiting for clear weather so they may enjoy this holiday at the ocean.

Dr. Bruce Baxter Addresses Student Body
