Interclass Sports

Due to the lack of suits to be issued out to each of the boys, this year's interclass football will be touch football instead of the real game of football. The fact one of the boys might get injured in regular football has influenced the change to this new type of game.

The touch football rules are different from these of real football. The rules are:

No one is allowed to block the defensive players down, if so, a penalty of 15 yards will be given to the offensive team. One must touch the ball carrier with two hands below the belt; anyone is allowed to receive a pass; there are six men on the line on the defensive team, and five men in the backfield.

The teams are the "Green" Freshmen, the Sophomores, the Juniors, and the "Mighty" Seniors. The Specials are to play for the Seniors since they haven't enough players. This coming Saturday, the classes are to have a jamboree and each team is to play fifteen minutes of touch football.
