

Home Rooms are Busy

Health Projects Proving Their Worth

The Flathead Home Room has taken a health project on "How to Remedy the Fly situation on the Campus." The members of the class are busy working for the solution of the problem. They are starting a map with the information which they have received since the first of the year.

The Siletz Home Room is studying a health problem concerning the distribution of more trash-disposal cans, and at the present are waiting for a map which will designate where the cans are to be placed. This map must be presented before an approval to order more trash cans can be made.

The Umatilla Home Room have been making posters on "Health Hints" and are to put out one poster each week. They are continuing to work on the map of their reservation which they started last year, and are progressing very nicely.

The members of the Tongue River Home Room have made a study of the Wheeler-Howard Bill, and have answered questions concerning it. They soon will start work on a health project.

The California Home Room is working on health posters about cleanliness and neatness, and are doing good work. They are drawing maps of where the Home Room members live—each one having a certain section to draw. They have studied some of the rules and regulations of the communities on the reservation.

The members of the Blackfeet Home Room is working on the health problem of "How to Rid the Campus of Flies." Each one is copying into notebooks the information from the reservation. Every week temporary officers are elected to preside at the meetings, thus giving everyone a chance to have this experience.

The Warm Springs Home Room follow a schedule each day. They discuss campus problems, practice parliamentary procedure, study the Constitution and By-laws of their reservation, and give current events one day of the week. They are well organized in this system and are doing nice work.

TULALIP No.1: The Snohomish boys are working on the map of Tulalip, Wash. Donna Mae Courville and Henry Cross are working on the map of the campus. Their health project is to keep leaves off the sidewalks, so every morning some member of the group sweeps the walks

near the school building and the print shop.

The Yakima Home Room has been studying as their health problem the "Safety Hazards of the campus." They are drawing a map of the campus showing the locations of the dangers, and have listed the hazards, which they are working on separately. There are other committees which have been appointed to get more information of the reservation and problems of the people.

Soon they will start the system of electing temporary chairmen and secretaries each week.

The Klamath Home Room have started drawing posters on health problems, and they hope to have them finished soon.

The Northern Idaho Home Room has taken three health projects: the water system, lighting conditions, and safety hazards. They have made an examination of the fountains on the campus, the lighting conditions, and have made reports on the number of fire-extinguishers; how many there are and how many more should be in the dormitories. They are making progress in their work and are very interested in their project.

The Fort Peck Home Room is undertaking the project of the lighting conditions of the campus. They have done some research work on the project, and have considerable results from it. They are making a map of their reservation.

The Fort Hall Home Room has selected as their health project the drawing of health posters, which were distributed about the campus. Besides their work on their map, they present questions and answers concerning the land survey.

COLVILLE No.1: A committee, headed by Lila Boyd, is studying and hopes to illustrate some of the campus hazards. The entire group is studying the health problems of their reservation.

COLVILLE No.2: The Home Room is studying the Constitution and By-Laws of the Colville Reservation. Their health project is the kitchen. Even though they haven't as yet gotten started, they hope to accomplish much in the future.

TULALIP No.2: Much discussion was made on which schools have more advantages, the Indian Schools or the Public Schools. These discussions were quite educational. The health project has joined "forces" with a few other Home Rooms in trying to improve the smoking-room problems.

TAHOLAH: This group is studying the education, health, fishing-hunting laws of the reservation. They are also studying about the jobs that are available on the reservation and vicinity. Their health project is the hazards on the campus; many safety first rules were suggested by the members.
